Neighborhood Beautification Grant

The HOA is in the process of applying for a neighborhood beautification grant from the City of Aurora. If awarded, this would be the second such grant Mission Viejo will have received. Mission Viejo plans to use the funds to continue the work that was started in the summer of 2015 of cleaning up rocks, dead and dying trees and shrubs, adding new ground cover, and making some of our more widely-visible public spaces cleaner, safer, and more lovely. The work will be completed by volunteers in the neighborhood (Yes, I'm looking at YOU!) during two Saturdays in June, the 10th and the 24th with a volunteer thank you celebration to be held at the Mission Viejo Park on July 15. Technology Changing Our TV Habits

The days of the whole family sitting around the TV watching the same show are over. We're still watching programming, but the options have boomed. According to The New York Times, the average American adult watches five hours and four minutes of TV per day, most of it live programming—about four and a half hours, with another 30 minutes coming from DVRs. That sounds like a lot, but it's actually down by 19 minutes from two years ago.

Most live programming is watched by people over 50. People 24 and under view about two fewer hours of live TV and DVR programming per week than they did in 2015. Millennials (25- to 34-year-olds) watch an hour less per week than that, down from 27.5 hours to 26.5. Viewers between 35 and 49 now mostly watch about 22 minutes less live programming per week.

Approximately 50 percent of U.S. households have subscriptions to online streaming services like Netflix or Hulu. With tablets increasingly common—58 percent of U.S. homes have at least one—time spent consuming media on them has risen 63 percent from 2015.



Music In Our Schools Month

The theme for the 2017 campaign is "Not Alone," providing a platform for educating the public about the incidence of brain injury and the needs of people with brain injuries and those in their families.

Fresh or Frozen? The Choice is Yours

Mom may tell you over and over again to eat fruits and vegetables that are fresh, but nutrition experts say that frozen produce isn't necessarily inferior. According to *The New York Times*, most nutrients are surprisingly hardy: Iron, for example, stands up to freezing quite well, and fiber does its job whether it's frozen or fresh.



Scientists at the University of California-Davis analyzed the vitamin content in several different varieties of fresh and frozen produce, including blueberries, broccoli, carrots, spinach, and strawberries. They found no significant differences between fresh and frozen items, and even discovered that frozen broccoli contains more riboflavin—a B vitamin—than the fresh selection. Similarly, frozen blueberries have more vitamin C than fresh.

Experts recommend looking for produce frozen using the IQF process—individually quick frozen—for the highest quality.

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Coyote Hazing is a SMART Way to Reduce Coyote Conflict in Your Community.

EVERY TIME you see a coyote in your community:

- Stop
- Make yourself as big as possible by raising your arms and widening your stance.
- Announce yourself. Tell the animal loudly and firmly to "Leave me alone!" or "Get out of here!"
- Repeat or Reinforce. The coyote might stop after a distance and look back at you. DO NOT STOP the hazing activity until the coyote completely leaves the area. If the coyote does not react initially, you may need to reinforce your hazing with more noise, stomping, lunging or exaggeration.
- Teach a neighbor or friend how to haze. Hazing works best when the whole community participates.

Expect results to improve as you continue to haze:

If it is the first time a coyote has ever been hazed, it may be slow to respond. Expect to use more exaggerated, aggressive and consistent hazing the first couple of times you try it. Individual response will be faster as the coyote experiences multiple hazings from multiple people.

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Critics Who Had to Eat Their Words

Even talented authors sometimes have to cope with short-sighted criticism. Here are a few examples of professional critics whose words may have come back to haunt them:

- In describing poet Emily Dickinson for an 1892 review in the *Atlantic Monthly*, Thomas Bailey Aldrich stated that “an eccentric, half-educated recluse in an out-of-the-way New England village—or anywhere else—cannot with impunity set at defiance the laws of gravitation and grammar.”
- *The New Yorker*'s Clifton Fadiman didn't mince words in his 1936 review of William Faulkner's novel *Absalom, Absalom!* Fadiman declared it “the final blowup of what was once a remarkable, if minor, talent.”
- In the mid-1960s H. L. Mencken came down hard on novelist Henry James, calling him “an idiot, and a Boston idiot, to boot, than which there is nothing lower in the world.”
- And in 1859, the *Saturday Review* made this bold prediction of Charles Dickens, author of *Great Expectations*, *A Tale of Two Cities*, *Oliver Twist*, and other great books: “We do not believe in the permanence of his reputation.”

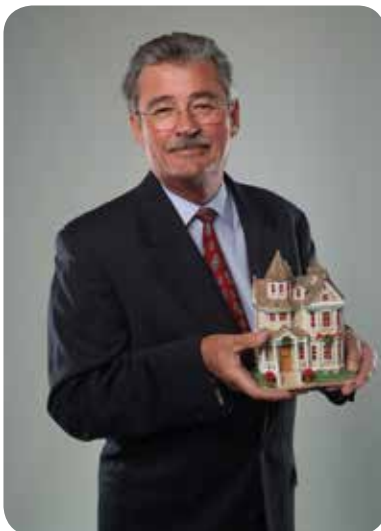

Be ready for These Uncomfortable Situations at Work

You'll face some awkward moments in your career, but your success depends on your ability to overcome your weaknesses. Be prepared for uncomfortable moments like these:

- **Accepting a compliment.** Criticism is hard to take, but for some people, accepting a compliment can be almost as nerve-wracking. Don't shrug compliments off or explain your actions at great length. Listen, thank the person sincerely, and then move on.
- **Misunderstanding data.** Even if your job doesn't involve analyzing numbers, learn some basics, like how to read a spreadsheet, understand a budget, recognize trends, and play with data to see what happens when you change a variable.
- **Admitting your mistakes.** We all make mistakes. Trying to hide them, or blaming them on forces beyond your control, makes you look unreliable and unprofessional. Own up to your errors honestly and then do your best to fix them.
- **Receiving criticism.** Everyone likes praise, but we usually learn more from criticism. Learn to listen with an open mind and without becoming defensive. If the criticism is accurate, do your best to change. If you think it's wrong, remain calm as you explain your point of view—and remember that you can't win every battle. Sometimes you'll have to take the criticism and keep going.

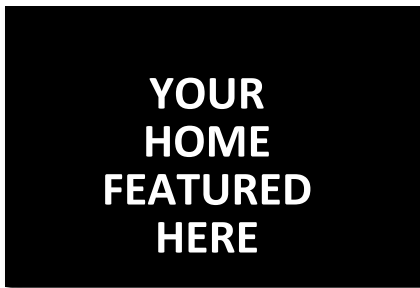


Reduce Anxiety In Your Children

- **Limit screen time.** TV and the internet can send lots of disturbing messages to your kids every day. Monitor what they're watching, and enforce a reasonable limit so they're not overwhelmed by negative news.
- **Keep kids busy.** Children won't have time to worry when their minds and bodies are active. Play games, do exercises, take them to the park or a museum—just keep them occupied as much as possible throughout the day.
- **Make sure they get enough sleep.** Fatigue exacerbates anxiety, so get children to bed on time and help them get the sleep they need. Start the process early enough that they're relaxed and ready for sleep at bedtime.
- **Eat a healthy diet.** Soda and snacks filled with sugar and caffeine can get children (and adults, for that matter) hyped up, making calm thought and relaxation more difficult. Stick to fruits, vegetables, low-fat foods, and drinks that aren't loaded with sugar or stimulants.
