

# Lakes' Winners Name the Parks



## Aurora Sales Success

Purchase agreements for a total of 119 new homes have been made at Mission Viejo Company's new planned community in southeastern Aurora, according to Bob Meek, project manager.

Dollar value of purchase agreements to date has surpassed \$3,800,000.

The new \$108-million development, which had its grand opening late in September, has been attracting record-breaking crowds, Meek said. He noted that sales office hours have been extended to 8:30 p.m. daily except Saturday, when the closing hour is 6:00 p.m., in order to accommodate all visitors.

Nine decorated model homes in the La Paz and Granada series, decorated by Denver native Nanja Williams of Costa Mesa, California, are open for inspection. Models are clustered around a central courtyard featuring expansive lawn areas and an Italian imported marble fountain.

The second unit consists of 36 La Paz homes and 54 Granada homes. La Paz homes are priced from \$38,995, and Granada homes start at \$28,995.

A wide selection is possible,

with fifteen different elevations being offered in Granada homes, and a similar number available in La Paz homes.

The homes feature extensive use of heavy wood exterior beams and distinctive architecture. The one-, two-story and tri-level homes with two or three bathrooms also feature formal entryways, vaulted ceilings and large master bedroom suites.

Construction is proceeding at a rapid pace on the Mission Viejo Recreation Center, which will feature an indoor, heated swimming pool, sauna and jacuzzi, and exercise rooms for men and women. The center will also include outdoor tennis courts.

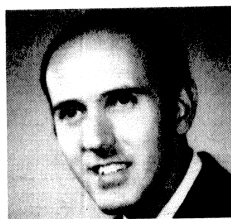
Located within the boundaries of the Cherry Creek school system, the community will have a new elementary school ready for classes by September, 1973.

## Kachinas-Supernatural Spirits at the Bowers Museum

Boogie men, spirits and masks do not always disappear after Halloween. Forty of them are holding court at the Charles W. Bowers Museum through December 31.

To the Hopi, Kachinas are supernatural beings who visit Pueblo Villages during the winter and spring seasons. They come to the villages to dance and sing, to bring gifts for the children, and above all to bring rain.

Not all Kachinas are benevolent. The Ogres and the Whippers punish offenders of ceremonial or social laws and are to be feared.

The Kachina spirits are impersonated by certain members of the tribe who don the appropriate mask, costume and traditional body designs. When a man does this, he becomes the Kachina he is impersonating.

Kachina dolls are miniature representations of the masked dancers who in turn represent the supernatural spirits and mythical ancestors of the Hopi Indians. The rich Hopi legends have yielded over 250 different kinds of Kachina dolls.

Kachina dolls today command prices of anywhere from \$100 to several thousand dollars. You can see why at the Bowers Museum, 2002 North Main Street in Santa Ana. For further information call 834-4024.
