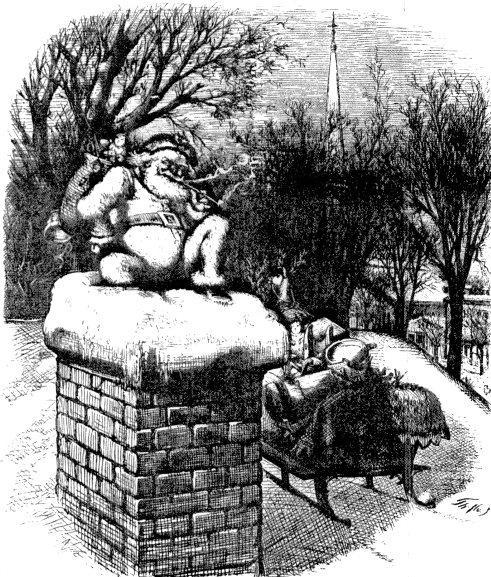

Defensive end, Lyle Alzado, defensive linebacker, Calvin Jones, running back, Fran Lynch and center, Bobby Maples spent a busy two hours on a beautiful afternoon in the model complex teaching aspiring youngsters how to deal with a long list of pigskin problems.

Bob Martin, "voice of the Denver Broncos," emceed the affair, which saw a number of parents join their youngsters for the in-person demonstration. All four players were kept busy signing autographs when they weren't handing out playing tips. The encounter with the Aurora Youth League players was their second workout for the day, since all four came to the clinic

directly from a two-hour morning workout in preparation for the nationally-televised game with the Oakland Raiders the following Monday.

Films supplied by the National Football League were shown in the recreation center, and free refreshments for both youngsters and their parents rounded out the afternoon.

WOMEN'S CLUB HOSTS CANDIDATES NIGHT

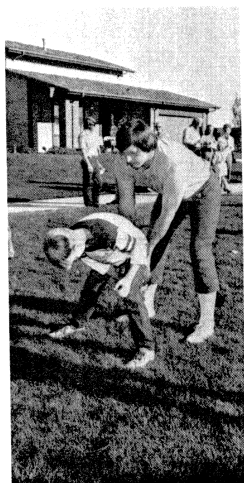
The Women's Club of Mission Viejo, Colorado, hosted a candidates night Wednesday, October 24, at 8 p.m., in the recreation center's adult lounge.
