Jay and Ann Greer, 26376 Mirar Vista, were double winners in the landscape contest sponsored by the Mission Viejo Beautiful Committee.

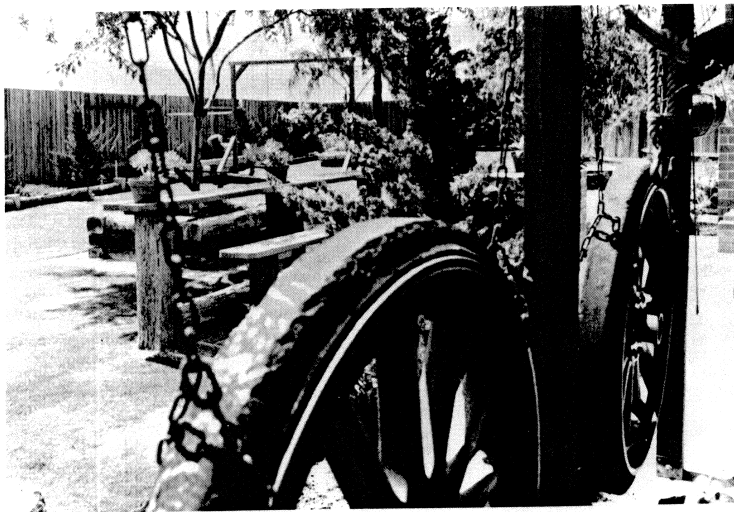

Bob Burrows of San Clemente High School has been selected the first recipient of the Steven Frogel Memorial Scholarship, to be awarded annually to a vocational student in the Saddleback Valley Unified School District or the Capistrano Unified School District.

The scholarship was presented at the SCHS awards assembly,

and Bob was subsequently honored at the South Coast ORT (Organization for Rehabilitation through Training) installation.

The annual award was established by Gertrude and Benjamin Frogel of Mission Viejo in the name of their beloved son Steven, who died two years ago at the age of 27 from cystic fibrosis.

Presented through South Coast ORT, the \$100 scholarship seeks to encourage the vocational student to seek greater skills and higher goals in his chosen field.

Afflicted from birth with cystic fibrosis, Steven Frogel was able to accomplish many of his goals during his short lifetime. A graduate of Fordham University, Frogel became a registered pharmacist in the State of New York and then moved to Southern California and became a registered pharmacist here, too.

## SV recreation program starts at three Mission Viejo sites

A recreation program initiated by the Saddleback Valley Youth Recreation Council, funded by the county and administered by the Saddleback Valley Unified School District, goes into effect July 1.

The youth program, utilizing more than \$14,000 in available county funds, will continue through August 24, using facilities at La Paz, Cordillera and Montevideo Schools.

Mini Teen Centers will be established at Cordillera and Mont-

tevedio with pool tables, pin ball machines and various table games. The centers will be open and chaperoned from 1 to 5 p.m. weekdays.

A larger Teen Center will be operated at the same times at La Paz—with extended evening hours on Tuesdays and Thursdays until 10 p.m.

This program will also coordinate various playground activities, instructional classes in karate, backpacking and tennis, table games, team sports and

tournaments as well as special events and field trips.

A directory, compiled by the SVYRC, listing both public and private recreation programs should be available at local schools by July 1.

The basic objective of the summer recreational program is "...to provide the area with well qualified recreational personnel in an attempt to fill the recreational void," said Mike Chilver, who has been instrumental in developing the program.
