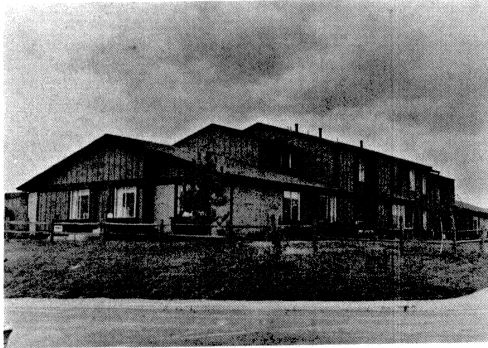


COMMUNITY CAPERS...COLORADO



SEVILLE TOWNHOMES — continue to be a popular choice among homebuyers at Mission Viejo's development in Aurora, Colorado. The new homes feature privately fenced individual courtyards, and some have vaulted ceilings with decorative wood beams. The homes are offered in two, three and four bedroom models, each with an oversize two-car garage.

RESIDENTS URGED TO VOTE

All residents of South Aurora are urged to register before October 5, so that they will be eligible to vote November 6 on the Library and Parks bond issue.

Ron Kirchoff, manager of planning and engineering, Mission Viejo Company, Aurora, said the issue is of particular importance to South Aurora residents.

"Our area has experienced greater growth in recent years than the older portions of the city," Kirchoff said. "The bond issue will assure that the cultural aspects of city life will be financed for the enjoyment of all South Aurora residents and their children."

He noted that a simple majority is required to pass the issue, which calls for \$3-million in park development and \$600,000 for a new library to be built in South Aurora.

Mission Viejo Company has donated a 2.2 acre site for the library, and plans are being made by the Women's Club for voters to register in the Mission Viejo Recreation Center.

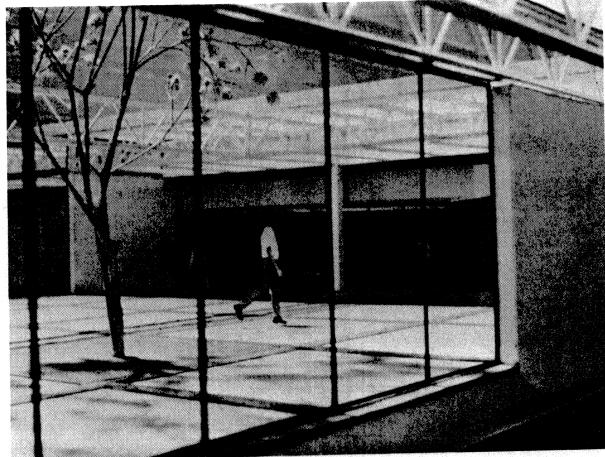
Land for the school was donated by the Mission Viejo Company, and the students in grades kindergarten through sixth, are finding such innovative ideas as a corridor in the shape of a low tunnel, a "wet area" for art and other craft activities, and a "crow's nest" in the media center. Youngsters are also enjoying

an open educational loft, a large activity and music room, and a learning disabilities facility.

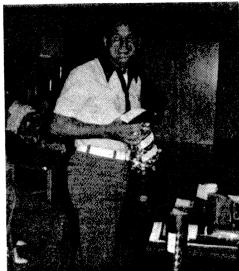
The 550 students enrolled have been organized into groups called "family units" and each is named after a mission in California. The team titles are: Santa Cruz (K-1); San Rafael (2-3); San Luis (3-4); and San Carlos (5-6).

Principal Jack Platt, who resides in Littleton, taught mathe-

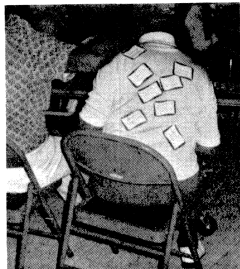
